



Your next phone call could save your life.

This is serious stuff. And the only serious response is to get a prostate cancer screening. A simple blood test that measures your PSA (prostate-specific antigen level) along with a brief physical exam could save your life. An elevated PSA level can be an early indicator of prostate cancer. Caught early, prostate cancer can be successfully treated.

Men 50 to 65 years old and men older than 40 with a family history of prostate cancer are already at risk. Prostate cancer is twice as common in African Americans. If you are in any of these risk groups, do the smart thing and get the screening. Or if you know someone who could benefit from this test, please tell him.
